9	LISA:	Yes?
10	DON:	Point Bruner The shoals off Point Bruner.
11		We could take her out there. No one would
12		ever know.
13	LISA:	Now? But, Don, it's five miles out! And the
14		fog. How
15	DON:	We've got to take the chance, Lisa.
16	LISA:	(PAUSE) Don, do we do we have to take her
17		out there?
18	DON:	Yes, yes we We have to, Lisa.
19	MUSIC:	(IN AND UNDER)
20	WHISTLER:	And so, your wife - Frances - is buried on
21		the fog shrouded shoals off Point Bruner
22		that night. The ceremony is brief - hurried
23		and silentexcept for the low wail of
24		the distant fog horn and the sound of the
25		waves against the rocks. Then a few minutes
26		before nine you ease the motorboat up
27		alongside the pier on the mainland and

1	DON:	Don't worry, Lisa. We'll make it. Shut the
2		motor off.
3	LISA:	What for?
4	DON:	Please will you do as I say?
5	SOUND:	(MOTOR OUT)
6	DON:	(PAUSE) The buoy is over in this direction.
7		Hear the bell?
8	LISA:	I think so but it sounds like it's
9		coming from the left. Can't we turn on any
10		lights?
11	DON:	We can't take a chance of being seen. The
12		shoals are straight ahead.
13	LISA:	Don, please. Let's not risk it. We don't
14		need the necklace!
15	DON:	Lisa, that necklace is worth ten thousand
16		dollars. If we're going to disappear and
17		make a new start we'll need money. It's
18		our one big break.
19	LISA:	(SHUDDERS) I know But I'm afraid,
20		darling. The rocks If we hit them we
21		won't have a chance. The current off the
22		shoals will take us out to sea. We'll drown.
23	DON:	(IN) Darling, listen to me. That necklace
24		out there means everything. It's a new start
25		a new start for the two of us. We've
26		always wanted that, haven't we? Don't be
27		afraid. We'll make it together.
